

PSA: Stay off the Lake Huron ice shelves!

The Lake Huron Coastal Centre joins municipalities and Conservation Authorities along the Lake Huron shoreline in warning residents not to walk near or on the ice shelves this winter.

What is an ice shelf?

As air and water temperatures drop, waves break up the ice that forms on the lake and push it to toward the shoreline where it refreezes and creates a fragmented shelf with very tall peaks. These ice shelves can stretch out several metres into the lake. While the accumulation of ice and snow may look like a solid extension of the shoreline, it is not.

Why are they dangerous?

During the winter, the water beneath Lake Huron's frozen surface is constantly moving. The ice that forms in many areas of Lake Huron is thinner and less stable than the ice that forms over ponds and other standing bodies of water. Along Lake Huron's shoreline, large holes and cracks are scattered throughout the snow-covered ice shelves. With one wrong step, individuals can fall through a weak or unfrozen area and get trapped in the caverns or plunge into the frigid waters. If water temperatures are cold enough, hypothermia can set in extremely quickly. Depending on the road conditions, it can be difficult for rescue crews to respond quickly.

What should you do?

Stay safe and observe Lake Huron's beautiful shoreline from a distance this year. Share this information widely to help get this important message out. It could save a life!
