THE VOICE FOR THE COAST

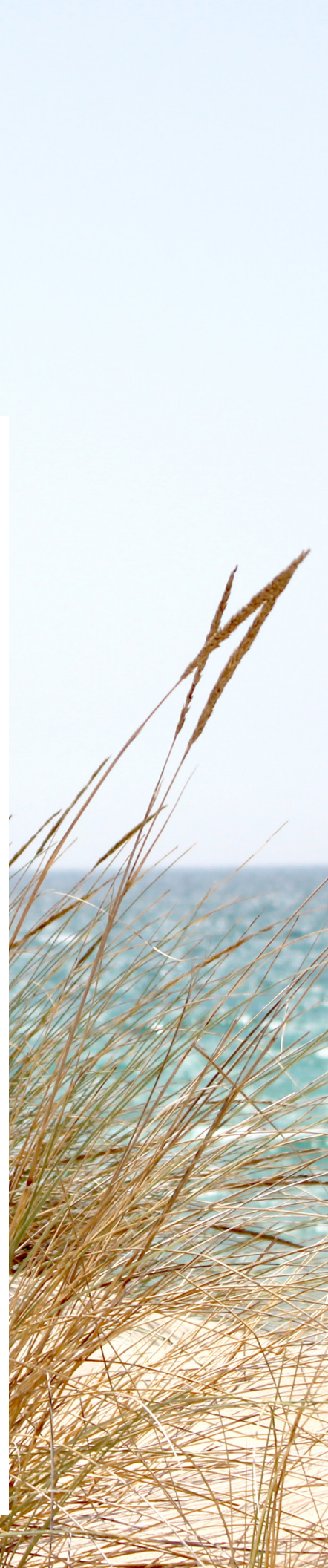
BRINGING HOPE AND ACTION TO COASTAL CONSERVATION


The need to protect Lake Huron's coast has never been more urgent. The Lake Huron shore is under stress. The research that produced the Lake Huron Coastal Centre's Coastal Action Plan studied 10 coastal ecosystems and uncovered the extent of the threat to the lake's southeastern corridor, identifying 16 major stressors on these fragile ecosystems. These include rapid shoreline development, the arrival of invasive species, increased plastic pollution, habitat degradation and the yet-unknown impacts of climate change.

These threats are intensifying as industries expand and more people choose to live year-round in lakeshore communities, bringing demand for ever-more services and infrastructure. Unless this expanding human presence is accompanied by careful protection and wise stewardship of Lake Huron's natural resources, our activities risk overwhelming the natural coast. The loss can be irreversible.

The creation of the Lake Huron Coastal Centre (LHCC) in 1998 anticipated the need for knowledgeable management of this collision between communities and the coast. The Lake Huron Coastal Centre was established to provide science-based evidence and raise public awareness around the threats to fragile ecosystems. The LHCC's programs have engaged residents of all ages in hands-on protection and restoration of sand dunes and wetlands, or in the management of invasive species. And the Centre has helped an array of stakeholders – from cottagers and municipalities to farmers – better understand how to mitigate those risks to the coastline, and to appreciate the economic benefits a healthy Lake Huron provides.

But while we've been doing this important work, the conservation landscape has evolved. In recent years, conservation has moved from a special interest movement to a force at the heart of a global environmental wave that is upending everything from politics to capital markets. It is no longer the preserve of small bands of professionals, abetted by committed citizens. Elevated by the sense of emergency surrounding climate change, conservation is a high priority political issue, with conservation activities attracting greater funding and investment, drawing wider engagement and greater sophistication in its tactics.





The LHCC is well-positioned to meet this moment. We have a strong foundation in climate change education. We connect people to the best available coastal science – the intellectual tools for good conservation. We provide people with opportunities to get their hands dirty on behalf of nature, delivering an emotional connection to the state and fate of the lake. We work with landowners to take care of their shoreline properties, showing how individual acts and small, incremental improvements lead to benefits for the entire lake. Our ethos – inclusive, experiential, hopeful, rooted in science and driven to share knowledge – aligns with the nature of conservation today. And we are blessed with a committed, talented staff, imbued with a strong sense of mission in their work.


At our core, we are a home for citizen conservation

A strategic focus on citizen conservation offers us a source of strength. Citizen-focused activities provide people with a sense of agency over a climate future that is overwhelmingly cast as gloomy. Our early shift towards greater digital outreach has already yielded encouraging fundraising dividends. The inevitable need for the Lake Huron Coastal Centre to have a greater digital focus was accelerated by the Covid-19 pandemic but also reflects the reality that our organization must function seamlessly in the digital space, merging our activities in the natural world with the opportunities for growth and greater impact that the virtual world affords.



Every program, piece of communication and fundraising initiative should be delivered through that prism. It is an iteration, not a revolution. But if we have the discipline to follow this strategic path, the Lake Huron Coastal Centre will have a differentiation and relevance in coastal conservation that will make us stronger, ensuring us an indispensable role in the fight to conserve the Lake Huron coast for generations to come.

ACCOUNTABILITY

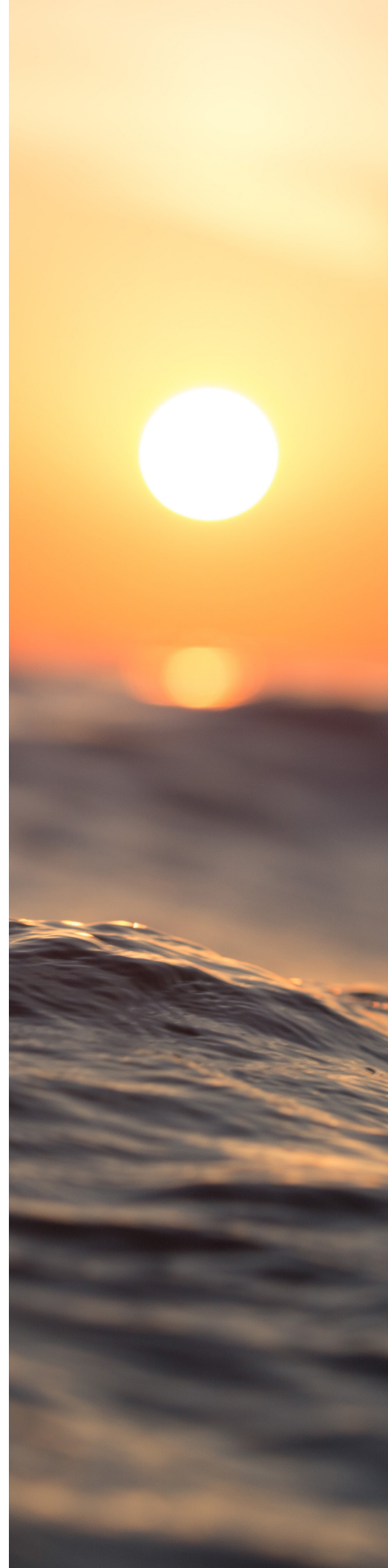
We are transparent and accountable to our donors, partners, and the public. We earn trust by following through with our commitments.

With a focus on invasive species management, native species protection, and natural habitat stewardship and restoration.

GOAL ONE

DEVELOP AND SHARE SCIENTIFIC KNOWLEDGE AND INNOVATIVE APPROACHES THAT ADVANCE DECISION-MAKING AND LEAD TO ON-THE-GROUND ACTION

ACTIONS

Develop innovative approaches in coastal management including nature-based solutions and green infrastructure, and demonstrate their environmental, social and economic benefits.

Identify and address coastal science data and information data gaps.

Develop informative and user-friendly communication materials and channels to share our coastal science with our partners and the public.

GOAL TWO

CONNECT COMMUNITIES WITH THE COASTAL ENVIRONMENT TO PROMOTE AWARENESS, APPRECIATION AND ACTION

ACTIONS

Maintain and create relationships with shoreline property owners and users, community groups, government organizations, and other stakeholders to better understand their interests, concerns and opportunities.

Engage volunteers, landowners and community members to connect with the coast, restore shoreline ecosystems, plant native plants, remove invasive species and embrace best practices to help make the coastal environment healthier.

Build capacity for our stewardship and education programs to increase coastal environmental literacy among people of all ages.

Continue to develop and implement a marketing and communications strategy that promotes the Lake Huron Coastal Centre, our programs, and environmental awareness and action.



GOAL THREE

BUILD A CLEAR IDENTITY FOR THE LAKE HURON COASTAL CENTRE AS A HOME FOR CITIZEN CONSERVATION AND POSITIVE ENVIRONMENTAL ACTION

ACTIONS

Review existing programs to ensure they comply with a citizen conservation mandate, driving inclusiveness and expanding engagement (inclusive in age, race, gender, ability, and level of understanding about Lake Huron).

Ensure that the Lake Huron Coastal Centre's identity is reflected in new programs and initiatives, including the content of online programming (seminars, workshops, conferences, etc.) and fundraising.

Infuse the Centre's identity as a home for citizen conservation into all events, communications and marketing materials, including a strong visual representation.

Leverage the citizen conservation identity to raise the Lake Huron Coastal Centre profile.





GOAL FOUR

ACCELERATE THE MIGRATION TO A DIGITAL ORGANIZATION, BOTH INTERNALLY AND IN PUBLIC-FACING PROGRAMS

ACTIONS

Increase the capacity of the Centre to function as a digital organization (internal operations, fundraising, media, managing relations with volunteers, donors and other stakeholders).

Conduct a review of the inventory of Lake Huron Coastal Centre content (particularly educational content) and update relevant content with best digital practices.

Explore and act on opportunities to use digital technologies to expand the Centre's reach and impact, notably on awareness-raising and public education initiatives. Digital tools (eg. apps, education kits) and data-based programming (an improved Coast Watchers program, for example) can enhance the Centre's impact and attract potential partnering organizations.

Take advantage of the vast digital data set collected to complete the Coastal Action Plan and utilize the data and data visualization tools to enhance our education and awareness programs.

OUR STRATEGY

CONSERVE YOUR COAST

Our citizen engagement programs inspire people to play an active role in conservation work, such as beach clean-ups, invasive species management, and our Green Ribbon Champion beach stewardship program.

KNOW YOUR COAST

Our coastal science and research initiatives, such as the Coastal Action Plan and our Coast Watchers citizen science monitoring program collect and analyze coastal environmental data while engaging citizens in the process. We strive to be a trusted source to turn the best Great Lakes science and knowledge into action.

FUTURE COAST

Our public awareness initiatives and educational programs find creative ways to communicate science, creating a network of informed citizens to act as coastal ambassadors committed to the protection of the Great Lakes. We are working with youth to create the next generation of coastal environmental champions.
